Short Courses in International Health January 25 – February 5, 2021

PUBLIC HEALTH ANTHROPOLOGY: CONCEPTS AND TOOLS

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Content Overview

This course introduces participants to cultural ideas and practices relevant to health and disease as a key to understanding peoples' behaviour. It gives an overview on medical systems as cultural systems, explanatory models, and health seeking behaviour.

Course participants apply qualitative research methods (ethnographic and rapid appraisal methods), tools used for data-collection (in-depth interviews, focus group discussions, observations) and analysis of data using Nvivo.

This course enables participants to apply anthropological approaches to public health care looking at case studies in the field of: reproductive health, malaria, diabetes, interdisciplinary and transcultural competences.

Main Topics

- Introduction to public health anthropology
- Research methods in public health anthropology
- Application of anthropological approaches to public health care provision

Target Group

Public health professionals, project planners and managers, paramedical staff, social scientists, and tropEd students.

Prerequisites

This course is held in English. Excellent command/high level of proficiency in reading, writing and speaking English is required (equivalent to IELTS 6.5). Furthermore participants have to download and install the 14-day tutorial and trial version of Nvivo 11 and bring their laptop to the course.

Learning Objectives

By the end of this course participants will be able to:

- Reflect on the use of ethnographic methods to conduct research in order to identify cultural paradigms and practices related to health and illness
- Employ an anthropological perspective in identifying problems and finding solutions to public health problems encountered in the field
- Apply the knowledge and skills acquired in class to develop research questions and define the methodology needed to do public health anthropology research
- Apply public health anthropology tools to collect and analyse data, including the use of software technology

Teaching and Assessment

This course combines lectures, case studies, group discussions and exercises as well as in class presentations. Participants work in groups of max. 4 people. Course participants are expected to attend teaching sessions full-time and participate actively in discussions and group assignments.

Assessment of the participants' achievement of the learning objectives will be determined by a portfolio submitted on the last morning of the course.

The short courses programme offered by the Heidelberg Institute of Global Health at Heidelberg University provides opportunities for continuing education and professional development. Short courses are open to the Institute's postgraduate students, students from other tropEd member institutions, and health professionals wanting to specialise or expand their knowledge

in a particular subject area in international health.
