Content Overview

Heart disease, stroke, cancer, diabetes and chronic lung disease are the major non-communicable diseases (NCD) which account for about 70% of all deaths worldwide. This NCD burden is not restricted to high income countries anymore. Nowadays, almost 75% of the global NCD deaths occur in low- and middle-income countries (LMIC).

More and more LMICs are facing major changes in their disease pattern. The improving control of infectious diseases results in a higher life expectancy which together with rapid lifestyle changes leads to an increase of chronic conditions and diseases. This transition bears extreme challenges for health policy and the health systems.

Prevention and service delivery are key to address the NCD burden especially in LMICs.

Main Topics

- Development of evidence-based models for NCD service delivery and prevention in low- and middle-income countries
- Strategies for capacity building, data generation and service implementation
- Critical appraisal of (local) evidence of NCD burden and availability / quality of data
- The applicability of international NCD guidelines in low- and middle-income settings

Target Group

Public health professionals, clinic managers, social scientists, paramedical staff, project planners and coordinators, medical doctors, tropEd course participants.

Prerequisites

This course is held in English. Fluency in English (reading, speaking and writing) is required.

Learning Objectives

By the end of this course participants will be able to:

- develop evidence-based models for NCD service deliverv
- critically appraise (local) evidence of NCD burden and availability and quality of respective data
- identify main challenges in and formulate strategies (capacity building, data generation, service implementation) for NCD service delivery in low- and middle-income countries
- assess the applicability of international NCD guidelines in local settings

Teaching and Assessment

The course aims to initiate an active participatory learning process. It uses a combination of lectures/ case studies, discussions in plenary, group work/class presentations, and self-study. Participants will work individually and in groups.

The course consists of 15 hours self-directed learning (5 hours preparatory reading plus 5 hours for writing a summary statement with regard to the pre-reading, plus 5 hours for an individual assignment after course end), 30 hours lectures/contact time, and 15 hours group work and presentations.

Participants' learning and contributions will be assessed on:

- Group assignment (50 %): Describing the local/ regional situation regarding the current burden of a specific NCD based on available data and developing evidence-based solutions/approaches for NCD service delivery
- Written individual assignment (50 %): discussion of the possible application of the gained skills and knowledge with respect to the applicability in his or her home country (1500 words).
